COURSE DESCRIPTION

Welcome to the 54th Annual Riley Pediatric Conference. The title of the conference is, “Driving the Future of Child Health, One Patient at a Time”. The two-day event will focus on how the following topics affect early brain development: Early Education, Environment, Genetics, Maternal Depression / Stress, Nutrition, Preterm Birth, Toxic Chemicals / Endocrine Disrupting Chemicals, and Toxic Stress.

This continuing educational conference addresses clinical best practices across a broad array of primary care pediatrics from the care of infants through adolescence.

Course Objectives:

Plenary objectives: At the conclusion of the conference, participants should be able to:

- List 5 pollutants that have been associated with adverse neurodevelopmental outcomes in the pediatric population.
- Recognize the importance of relationships as a key driver for development early in children's lives with a new awareness of toxic stress and how it differentially affects the early brain and results in long-term issues.
- List the common forms of long-acting reversible contraception (LARC), and describe how increased LARC use can reduce adolescent unintended pregnancies.
- Review the challenge of infant mortality in Indiana and discuss how moms can foster a healthy pregnancy.

Hot Topic objectives: At the conclusion of the conference, participants should be able to:

- Explain simple and effective ways to incorporate early literacy promotion into well visits to foster early brain development and school readiness.
- Explain the "why" behind the AAP's safe sleep recommendations to families in the era of social media and an ever-expanding market of infant sleep products.
- Recognize important causes of hypotonia that have required early treatment.
- Explain collagen vascular diseases which are influenced by environment as well as discuss ultraviolet exposure effects on the skin.
- Describe how early nutritional experiences in the infant can alter later neuropsychological development.
- Discuss the effects of trauma and toxic stress on the developing brain and how those changes can manifest in adolescence and adulthood.

Interactive Lectures objectives: At the conclusion of the conference, participants should be able to:

- Advise families on behaviors that will reduce chemical exposures.
- Strategies to address developmental and psychosocial concerns such as school issues, parenting concerns, bullying, insomnia, toxic stress. Also be able to describe the demographics of immigrant children in Indiana
- Explain the neurobiology of Attachment Theory and how postpartum depression affects the neurodevelopment of the infant.
- Describe how resilience can counteract the negative effects of stress.
- Teach physicians new skills, to better promote stewardship among learners.
- Review the available data about the use of screens from birth through adolescence and discuss developmental concepts that underlie the current recommendations for screen usage in children. Learners will also be able to elaborate on the historical context of marketing to children and the effect it may have upon them. You will also be able to explain the pros and cons of digital media and e-book usage.
- Explain the primary care provider's role in developmental screening and how Help Me Grow can assist practices in implementing recommended screening as well as learn examples of other resources that primary care providers can use to promote early brain development during office visits.
- Perform, with confidence and efficiency, a needs-based assessment with meaningful community based referrals.
- Discuss how their practice can support healthy social emotional development in infants and the parent-child relationship.”
