Course Description

Designed for pediatricians, family practice physicians and others providing primary healthcare to children. This course will review current scientific advances as they apply to daily practice. Participants will advance their diagnostic and therapeutic skills through this practical evidencebased review.

Course Objectives

At the conclusion of this course, participants should improve their knowledge in current diagnosis and treatment guidelines and should be able to:

- State the advantages of minimally invasive surgery over open surgery for certain pediatric conditions.
- Explain what two main factors guide treatment for scoliosis. (Hint: Degree of curvature and Level of skeletal maturity).
- Become reacquainted with normal gait and alignment in children, and to recognize when things are not progressing normally. We will review typical gait problems that come to primary care (intoeing, acute and chronic limps) and alignment problems (bow legs, knock knees etc.).
- Explain to others that the Umbilical hernias usually do not require surgical intervention before the age of 3-5 years of age. Therefore, referral for an uncomplicated (reducible) umbilical hernia is usually not necessary until 3 years of age.
- Discuss the indications for surgical repair in patients with pectus excavatum.
