Ana Núñez, MD, addresses the importance of conflict resolution in the medical profession at this year's Merritt Lecture. Whether you're in the boardroom or exam room, learn to recognize the potential for conflict and how to communicate effectively to optimize outcomes.

Dr. Núñez, a professor of medicine at Drexel University College of Medicine in Pennsylvania, is a nationally recognized medical education and health services researcher. She has developed novel curriculum across the health professional training spectrum and to lay audiences. Her cultural competency curriculum was cited as an exemplar of excellence in the Institute of Medicine's health disparities report, *Unequal Treatment*. Her curricular expertise include topics in sex and gender medicine, primary care, trauma/violence prevention and cultural competence. She has numerous health services awards in areas such as HIV/AIDS; intimate partner violence; healthier sexual-health lifestyles; barriers for engagement in research, and nutritional advocacy.
